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## Barred Owl

Whoooo is this owl with such a strange name? Let's find out. Look closely at the feathers, you'll see horizontal bars around the neck and vertical streaking on the body. This owl also has large horizontal bars or bands on the tail which you may see in flight against its gray feathered background. This is how the owl got it's name, "bar--ed" owl. It stands about 21 inches tall, has a bulky head and neck with dark eyes and no ear tufts. Barred owls live in most of North America in wet woodlands, wooded swamps, and floodplains in the cavities of snags (old dead trees). These owls are usually long-time residents of the same snag, with an address 80 feet in the air and a 20 inch doorway.

Barred owls have an easy call to identify. Listen for a hoot that sounds like someone saying, "Who-cooks-for-you, who-cooksfor-you-all?" You may hear the whole phrase or only a part. If you hear a cat-like scream or a barking sound, check it out, it may be a barred owl nearby. In February and March keep especially alert for these owls, they're courting and going wild, making all kinds of noises to impress a potential mate. These owls may also be spotted in the daytime being mobbed and teased by a flock of scolding birds.



## Friends of Dutch Hollow Lake

Thank you so much for your support for the Friends of Dutch Hollow Lake (FDHL) in 2023. The last year was a very busy year for the Qualified Lake Association both in terms of actions taken to manage the current level of invasive species and the long-term management of the lake. We had a total of 157 members last year (up 26 from the previous year)!

We would like to share some of last year's accomplishments and help everyone understand what the focus will be for the FDHL in 2024.

#### 2023 Accomplishments

#### Lake Management

- *Lake Management Plan:* The WDNR requires that FDHL have an approved lake management plan in place to treat for invasive species, apply for grants and manage the lake. Our updated plan running from 2023-2028 was approved by the WDNR in April.
- *Invasive Species Management:* We understand the frustration that many had with the invasive species issue on the lake; especially in Woodland Bay and around the Association docks. We have learned from past experiences that we need to use several different approaches to control the Hybrid Eurasian Water Milfoil (HEWM). Our control options include the following (all control efforts must be approved by the WDNR before beginning any work):
  - Herbicide Treatment A liquid herbicide is applied to a specific section the lake. A large-scale use of this method is typically only allowed every 3-5 years. If we use the herbicide too much, the HEWM may become resistant to the herbicide and could negatively impact native species.
  - Diver Assisted Suction Harvesting (DASH) a scuba diver removes the plant by the roots & a suction tube pulls the plant onto a boat. The goal with this method is to stop the fragmentation (and spreading of the plant) when removing the HEWM. This method is best in small areas with a dense amount of HEWM.
  - Manual Removal a snorkeler removes the plant by the root and places it into a bag for removal. This method is best when the amount of HEWM is low, and the threat of fragmentation is lower.

#### Activities in 2023

- Herbicide Treatment Treated 9.9 acres in the Woodland Bay area with ProcellaCOR. The treatment was very successful in killing the majority of the HEWM.
- DASH Work completed DASH work around several of the Property Owners Association's docks. A total of 4 days of DASH work was be performed.
- Manual Harvesting –completed manual removal in the beach area and areas chemically treated in 2022. A total of 4 days of manual harvesting was performed.
- *Fisheries Committee:* The FDHL committee has focused on improving the fish habitat with the use of fish cribs and fish sticks. The hope is to install of some of these items in the winter of 2024-2025. We are looking for someone to chair this committee. If you are interested, please call the office.
- **2023** Aquatic Plant Management Survey: FDHL will receive the 2023 Aquatic Plant Management Survey results from our consultant, Aquatic Plant and Habitat Services LLC, in early January 2024. The preliminary report showed the amount of HEWM detected in 2023 was much lower than in 2022. This appears to indicate that our control efforts were successful. However, the HEWM was found to be dense in the Remington Bay area. This survey was used as the basis for developing our invasive species management plan for 2024.

Muskrats – Trapped and removed 109 muskrats from the lake.

### <u>Financial</u>

### <u>Costs</u>

Last year the FDHL spent a significant amount of money on several activities:

\$25,054 – Herbicide treatment (includes treatment & required testing)

\$11,7589 – DASH (including survey costs)

\$9,600 – Manual Removal

\$3,845 – Point intercept survey and aquatic plant report

## <u>Grants</u>

Sauk County Grant: The Friends of Dutch Hollow Lake again received a Grant through the Sauk County Lake Management Grant Program. A total of \$18,992 from Sauk County grants was received in 2023. The funds were

used to help with offset the cost for herbicide treatment.

**WDNR Grants:** In 2023 FDHL received \$6,188 from a grant approved in 2022. The funds were used for the DASH work.

The total grants funds received of \$25,180 is a huge savings to all property owners. In the past, the DHLPOA would have been required to provide these funds. (*For reference, the DHLPOA donates \$13,000 annually to FDHL for lake weed control but has expended a great deal more than that amount in previous years.*)

### Donations

*Member Donations:* In 2023, we received a total of \$6,440 in donations from Association members (\$3,750 in general donations & \$690 for muskrat trapping, and \$2,000 from DHL Races).

## 2024 Plans

*Invasive Species Management:* We need to continue our efforts controlling the HEWM. We plan to continue using several control methods in 2024 (still need to be approved by the WDNR):

- Herbicide Treatment Treating 1.9 acres in the Remington Bay area with ProcellaCOR. The cost of this work is budgeted at \$11,000.
- DASH Work 5 days DASH work around several of the Property Owners Association's docks. The cost of this work is budgeted at \$14,000.
- Manual Harvesting –5 days of manual removal in the areas previously treated with herbicide. The cost of this work is budgeted at \$12,000.
- 2023 Aquatic Plant Management Survey: Part of our lake management plan requires that an Aquatic Plant Management Survey be completed each year. In addition, it provides historical data used to justify chemical treatment for invasive species. The cost for this work is \$5,800.

*Sand for the Beach* – We hope to add sand to the beach area. The cost of this work is budgeted at \$5,000. *Muskrats* – Continue to control the muskrat population.

## Grant Opportunities:

- We applied for a \$22,750 WDNR grant to help offset the costs of herbicide treatment, manual removal, and aquatic plant survey work. We will find out in February if our grant has been approved.
- We will apply for a grant from Sauk County in March. We anticipate our grant to be approved by the County.
- We expect to receive \$1,241 in funding as final payment from a WDNR grant approved in 2022.

We have developed an ambitious plan in 2024 to try to control the invasive species and maintain the quality of the lake. As you can see, the cost of work planned for 2024 is significant. We encourage you to consider making a taxdeductible donation to the FDHL to help support this important work.

There will obviously be additional issues that the Friends of Dutch Hollow Lake will be exploring during 2024, but hopefully this gives our members a glimpse into the areas that the FDHL Board has been focused on in 2023 and what we view as top priorities for next year.

### Annual Meeting

The FDHL annual meeting is scheduled for April 27, 2024, following the DHLPOA annual meeting. The meeting will be held at the clubhouse.

We are sincerely encouraging our members to consider re-upping their membership dues of \$5.00 a person (Wisconsin state law requires us to charge a minimum of \$5 per member) to help us maintain our status as a Qualified Lake Association and continue the critical work of maintaining the health of our lake. (*Part of the review process when approving grants is the number of members of the Association. The more members we have, the better our chances of our grant being approved*). Each family member can join the Association. Please find membership information details on the next page.

Friends of Dutch Hollow Lake is a Qualified Lake Association that was formed in February 2020. This group was formed to preserve and protect a lake and its surroundings, and to enhance the water quality, fishery, boating safety, and aesthetic value of a lake.

- Friends of DHL membership and dues are voluntary.
- Dues are to be paid on a calendar year basis.
- Qualified Lake Association (FDHL) has <u>no powers</u> over the lake <u>community residents.</u>
- <u>Membership is limited</u> to those people with an interest in protecting the lake. It is limited to individual, family, business, or organizations that: <u>Own or lease property</u> within <u>one mile</u> of the lake. Reside on or within <u>one mile of the lake</u> at least one month each year.
- Incorporated under Section 181 of the Wisconsin Statutes to be eligible for DNR or state funding.
- Incorporated as a tax-exempt 501(c)(3) organization so that contributions are tax deductible.

Before the group was formed, the Dutch Hollow Lake Property Owners' Association (DHLPOA) performed all the functions of a Qualified Lake Association. However, a Property Owners' Association does not qualify for DNR and State grants so, the Association paid for all the costs associated with protecting the Lake.

## So, where are the Monarchs right now and how do they find their way?

Monarchs in Eastern North America have a second home in the Sierra Madre Mountains of Mexico. Monarchs in Western North America overwinter in California. Pretty nice surroundings for the winter, right!! Using environmental cues, the monarchs know when it's time to travel south for the winter. Researchers are still investigating what directional aids monarchs use to find their overwintering location. It appears

to be a combination of directional aids such as the magnetic pull of the earth and the position of the sun among others, not one in particular. Monarchs use a combination of

air currents and thermals to travel long distances. That sounds like a built in GPS, truly amazing!

## Playing It Safe

## **Ice Safety**

If you head out to one of Wisconsin's many lakes or rivers to ice fish, snowmobile, ATV, cross-country ski, or just to enjoy a winter day, we want you to have fun and be safe. A bit of advance planning and practicing basic ice precautions can help you return home safely.

## When Is Ice Safe?

There really is no sure answer, and no such thing as 100 percent safe ice. You cannot judge the strength of ice by one factor like its appearance, age, thickness, temperature or whether the ice is covered with snow. Ice strength is based on a combination of several factors, and they can vary from water body to water body. Ice strength can also vary in different areas of the same body of water.

## Know Before You Go

Because ice conditions vary, it is important to know before you go. The DNR does not monitor local ice conditions or the thickness of the ice. Local bait shops, fishing clubs and resorts serve winter anglers every day and often have the most up-to-date information on how thick the ice is on local lakes and rivers, as well as areas that are especially dangerous.

## Safety Tips

- Dress warmly in layers.
- Don't go alone. Head out with friends or family. Take a cell phone if available, and make sure someone knows where you are and when you are expected to return.
- Know before you go. Don't travel in areas you are not familiar and don't travel at night or during reduced visibility.
- Avoid inlets, outlets or narrow that may have current that can thin the ice.
- Look for clear ice, which is generally stronger than ice with snow on it or bubbles in it.
- Carry some basic safety gear: ice claws or picks, a cellphone in a waterproof bag or case, a life jacket and length of rope.

## **2024 GIVE A HOOT AND REBOOT CHALLENGE**

Are you suffering from "Winteritis"? Holidays are over. The days are short and the nights too long. You had to move out one notch on your belt. You feel like crawling into a cave and waiting for

Spring? Yep Winteritis.

It's time to do something about it. "Life is



like a bicycle, to keep your balance you must keep moving!" Albert Einstein. It's time to "GIVE A HOOT AND REBOOT" – improve your current situation and find your inner drive.

Active Daily Living and Dutch Hollow are here for you. We are teaming up to help you "GIVE A HOOT AND REBOOT" The American Heart Association recommends getting a

minimum of 150 minutes per week of moderate cardio and 20 minutes of strength training per/week. Cardio is defined as any type of exercise



that makes your heart and lungs work harder than they do at rest. Strength training (also known as resistance training) is defined as exercises that make your muscles work against weight or force to improve overall strength.

Let me introduce the "GIVE A HOOT AND REBOOT" challenge. This challenge will run January 14 – February 10. Participants are being challenged to complete 150 minutes of cardio each week and 20 minutes of strength training per week. It is important to note that you do not have to do all physical activity at once. You can break it up into smaller chunks throughout the day.

Participants will be asked:

- -to sign a waiver,
- -record their activity and time on a given calendar,
- turn in their completed calendar after the designated 4 weeks,

- enter to win various prizes.

On Saturday, January 13<sup>th</sup> from - 10:00 a.m., I will be 9:00 available at the clubhouse to handout waivers and calendars. answer questions, and share movement and strength training ideas. We will end with a 15 minute workout demonstration. Anyone attending this informational meeting is eligible to win prizes geared toward working out. To support participants through their "REBOOT", I will be available at the clubhouse from 9:00 – 10:00 a.m. on January 27. It will be a time to talk through obstacles, share incentives, and end with a brief workout.

The "GIVE A HOOT AND REBOOT" challenge ends on Saturday, February 10. For participants that are available to attend, we will meet one last time at the clubhouse 9:00 – 10:00 a.m.

At this time, participants will turn in their calendars to enter to win more prizes and participate in one last workout. For participants that are not able to attend, please e-mail me your calendar by 8:00 a.m. February 10 to enter the drawings.

#### FYI:

Weight, speed, time and intensity all play a role in how many calories one burns while moving. However, the average person burns approximately 5 calories per/ minute walking up stairs at a slow pace, and 4 calories per/minute going down stairs. The average person burns between 100 - 300 calories on a 30 minute walk. The average person burns approximately 260 calories in 30 minutes riding a stationary bike.

Strength training – you don't have to have a gym to work on muscle strength. Use your own body. Pushups, air squats, lunges, held yoga poses are a few examples of using your own body to improve strength.

Keep On Movin class is held every Monday and Wednesday, 9:00 a.m. at the clubhouse. Cost is \$5.00 per/session. There is the option of purchasing a \$45.00 punch card for 10 classes giving you one free class. Great way to get both your cardio and strength training in.

## Nature Trail News

Have you ever been walking in the woods, on the Dutch Hollow Nature Trail and wondered where all the wild animals were hiding? Deer are easy to spot as they run off through the trees with their white flag tails in the air. You might hear an owl hooting, or a hawk calling out. Squirrels and chipmunks might scurry through the leaf litter, but what about everyone else?



Coyotes: the sound of coyotes howling at night is ubiquitous at Dutch Hollow, but are they watching us during the day as we walk on the trail? Probably not. Their habits are crepuscular, active at dawn and dusk, and nocturnal. During the day, they are most likely napping in their dens, usually in a hillside, under a large rock, under the roots of an uprooted tree, or in an old log. Coyotes are active year round, are monogamous, and breed from February to March.



Raccoon: Where are those pesky raccoons hiding? The answer is, hollow trees.

underground dens in prairie grasslands, or perhaps under your porch. Raccoons are also nocturnal, do not hibernate, but do enjoy a very long nap in a comfortable den during the coldest days of January and February. Badger: Wisconsin is known as the Badger State, but not because of this shy, solitary mammal, which is present throughout the state, but because of the lead miners of the 1920's, who lived in tunnels burrowed into the hillsides.



Badgers make their dens on road embankments and grassy hillsides, staying inside their dens most of the day, avoiding human contact. They sometimes hunt cooperatively with coyotes. During the winter, badgers enter into a condition called torpor, during which body temperature is lowered, heart rate and respiration decrease.



Bobcat: Bobcats are sometimes spotted by Dutch Hollow residents, and surprisingly, Wisconsin has four times as many as the mountainous states such as Colorado. They feed on small mammals, birds and carrion, making their dens in hollow logs, rock crevices, or under a pile of tree branches. Bobcats generally steer clear of humans, but if you're on the trail and see one, simply back away while making loud noises. They remain very active during the winter due to their high metabolism, hunting primarily at dawn and dusk.



Skunks: One mammal you definitely don't want to cross paths with on the trail, is the striped skunk. They live in a burrow, often in a hollow log or tree crevice. The odorous yellow substance skunks spray from their glands when they feel threatened, is the gift that keeps on giving. Fortunately, they are mainly nocturnal in their habits.

The Dutch Hollow Lake area is the natural habitat for many other mammals, including mink, river otters, ground hogs a.k.a. woodchucks, just to name a few. A bear and a cougar have also been spotted by Dutch Hollow residents passing through the area.

In conclusion, stay away from hollow logs, and if you've been procrastinating on exploring the trail, every season is a good season to get out there and see who you might spot..... The trail is open year round to walkers, hikers, and in the winter when there is snow, snowshoeing. It is a fabulous amenity that is free to everyone.


